

# NOYF WINNER'S SPOTLIGHT Will and Heather Cabe (GA 2020)

"You want to nominate me for what?" I remember the conversation very well when our county extension agent asked our permission to nominate us for the National Outstanding Young Farmer award. I grew up on a farm and had had at least some stake in farming on my own since high school, and I did not know that there was such a thing. An award? For farming? I recalled the sentiments of Oliver Wendell Douglas from the popular television show Green Acres from the 1960's, and I knew that caring for the land and using it to produce a crop whether it grain, vegetable or livestock should be reward enough, and I could look around to some of the young farmers in our community and think that there were many who were doing it better than me. "I think you might be surprised," my county agent persisted, and so ultimately we consented and what a great decision that proved to be.

I cannot remember having ever encountered an organization that focused so greatly on fostering the relationships between its newest members as the Outstanding Farmers of America, and it did not take long to understand why this was so important. It's easy to see that the success of the OFA is predicated upon these connections and how they have endured for years upon years is incredible, something that I have not seen in any other organization of which I have been a part. The very fact that it seems to rest entirely on the continuing efforts of previous classes as opposed to having some corporate-like governing body, not to mention the unbridled enthusiasm that is absolutely contagious by seemingly everyone in attendance...

it was certainly enough for Heather and We grew

I to buy in. And the incredible families and farming operations that the members represent! I am still honored and blown away by the fact that we should even be in the same room with such an outstanding group of people.

I would like to give you an idea of how the Cabe family got here. In the early 2000's I was as convinced as most of the young men that grew up where and how I did that I was going to be the next great baseball player, and while I knew that I would keep and maintain the small family farm I grew up on, I was working hard to pursue that goal. However, the call of farming was already there and certain priorities started shifting in my life about that time, and when I was told that multiple surgeries stood between me and the next step in baseball I knew that God in his providence had other plans for me. I had already been heavily involved in both 4-H and FFA and showing livestock and competing in livestock based competitions, and I was very blessed for my success therein to earn a scholarship to judge livestock at Northeastern Oklahoma A & M. But it was before that time, while I was still in high school, that with help and advice from my parents we began expanding the farm for my return after college was over. When that time came, a more rapid expansion project began, and I was committed and devoted myself to making the farm the most efficient and profitable that it could be. I knew that this was how I wanted to raise a family, and although you may be looking for that funny anecdote of how I met my wife, I hope you're not disappointed to learn that we had known each other our entire lives. We grew up together in church where

both our families attended, and the fact that Heather, like me, had grown up on a cattle and poultry farm meant that we were destined to be a part of the same farming circles. We've been married now ten years, and there is no question that my farming endeavors have been more fun since she's been a part. Trust me, I understand what Genesis is talking about when woman is given to man to be a "help meet" for him, because I don't



know how I could continue without her assisting on the farm and guiding the house. And don't skip over that guiding the house part, because with two sons (Deacon is 8 and Teller is 5) and one daughter (Emersyn is 2), that could be a full time job without even mentioning that Heather is the homeschool teacher to all.

It cannot be overstated what my family means to me and what I do and the decisions I make every single day. As far as the farm is concerned, nothing I do is in the name of self-promotion and no "right-now" decisions are made. Instead, my entire focus is on making the farm better than it was the day before so that my three children have the opportunity to take it and raise their families the same way if they desire to do so. The family is IN the farm, but the farm is also IN the family. I've been blessed to see the same love for farming and animal agriculture in my children that I've always had myself. That love is manifested in the form of showing and exhibiting livestock: we've shown pigs, goats, and sheep, and we attend 20-25 shows per year. Yes, this takes a lot of our weekends. Yes, this takes most of our summertime hours in the barn working. But this is what we do as a family. This is OUR thing. We don't do a lot of vacationing, amusement parks, or weekend getaways; we go to shows. It is so important to me that my family and farm are so interrelated, and I thank God daily that he has given us this opportunity.

We look very much forward to the privilege of being involved in the OFA going forward, and hope to have the chance to visit with more of the members that make it up at future events. We all know that farming as a profession is not always easy; there are so many variables that can make life challenging at times. But I encourage each of us to persevere and be a rock in our communities. In other words, OFA family, just keep being OUTSTANDING!

#### NOYF WINNER'S SPOTLIGHT

Mike and Mary Beth Jackson (IA 2020)

I would like to first say thank you to the past classes of the Outstanding Farmers of America for welcoming us into this organization. Mary Beth and I are very honored to be part of the 2020 class. We made several new friends and are looking forward to next year's NOYF Congress. Also a very special thank you to John Deere and all the hands that worked very hard to have everything in place for this year's Award Congress, for the sponsorship of this prestigious honor awarded to us and our class of 2020.

My father reminds me of a story, one spring day during the lunch hour, I proceeded to pull hitch pins from all the equipment lined up in the barnyard. I proudly parked my little red wagon, piled high near the backdoor. They quickly replaced the missing

pins, all except one. Dad figured out a day later when he pulled the grinder mixer out of the shed, oops! Dad still says he's amazed a four year old could pull 7 hitch pins in such a short time. I was always my father's shadow. It's enjoyable watching my kids ask similar questions and willing to take on certain chores and responsibilities like me at their age. Unfortunately for them I use bolts or a clip of some sort on the bottom of my hitch pins so they would need to work a little harder to perform the same task.

A little background on Mary Beth and I, we both grew up in Mahaska county in Southern Iowa. Mary Beth grew up on her family's farrow to finish swine, dairy and row crop

farm south of Pella lowa on the West side of the county. I grew up east of Oskaloosa on the East side of the county on my family's swine and row crop farm. Mary Beth and I now live on my family's century farm just east of Oskaloosa. I grasped the opportunity to return to the family farm and begin my adult career of farming with the building of our segregated early wean swine facility to ensure a place for Mary Beth and I on the family farm with my parents Mark and JoAnn. We have been fortunate enough to lease this building to another young farmer and his brother allowing them to return to their family's farrowing operations; at that time we started Jackson Seed Sales working with Latham Hi Tech Seed and Iowa cover crops. We are very passionate about family, soil health and education on our farm. Multiple classrooms know me as Farmer Mike; by using the Farm Chat platform I am able to take a class room full of kids into my swine buildings or in the tractor cab and better explain



modern ag to them, with a hands on digital approach. The teachers like it because we can keep the visits short 30 minutes and then they are back



to normal routine. We have done this with a class in Florida, Alaska and local Oskaloosa. We have also hosted multiple farm tours on our farm talking about conservation practices we use with local farmers and foreign visitors. The practices we discuss include contour buffers, no-till, grassy waterways and terraces, woodlands, stream buffer strips, settling ponds and wetland restoration projects.

Our kids are the main reason we do

everything on the farm to keep the soil fertile and on our land. Our oldest, Arianna, is in her 2 year of 4H, and she is looking forward to getting another bucket bottle calf project. Johnathon our middle son is looking forward to joining the 4H club come August; he enjoys helping us on the farm where he can. Mack, our youngest, is always ready for a tractor ride with me or my dad. Mary Beth and I are both very active in our local community and state level with Iowa Farm Bureau and Mahaska County Farm Bureau, our church, the kids' school.Oskaloosa Christian Grade School, and the Sonshine preschool our kids attended. I am also part of Iowa State Extension and South Skunk watershed advisory boards.

I hope everyone has a safe growing season and a bountiful harvest. Mary Beth and I are looking forward to next February and seeing everyone again in Wisconsin.
